In Canopy 131 we heard from a brother in Russia giving his insights into the current situation in the world. This time we would like to give the opportunity for a Ukrainian brother to share his thoughts with us.

Today is the day 116 of the war in Ukraine. It is hard to describe with words the pain, tragedy and grief that we as Ukrainians feel. I have never thought that the war would last so long.

Some cities are demolished to ashes, there are mass graves where the bodies of thousands of tortured, innocent civilians are buried. The violence of Russia’s armies is horrific and incomprehensible. In some occupied areas of Ukraine Russian occupants prohibit church services and persecute Christians.

It is estimated that nearly 11 million people have fled their homes. According to the United Nations, Ukraine is experiencing the fastest growing refugee crisis since the Second World War.

Yet, in times like this there is Light coming from the work of God’s church. A war can’t stop God from moving in the lives of people. Jesus said “I will build my church and the gates of hell will not prevail against it” (Matthew 16:18)

Update:-

The overturning of the Roe v Wade decision in the USA could cause ramifications across Europe where there are also opposing views on abortion legislation. Some countries are currently resisting calls from both European and international institutions to declare that abortion is a basic human right. Let us remember and pray for the USA as they see angry confrontations that could so easily be replicated in Europe.

Additional Prayer Points:-

1. Pray for Lithuania as they implement the EU sanctions on certain goods being transported to Kaliningrad, which has angered the Kremlin.
2. Pray that there would not be any escalation of incursions by the Russian military into Estonia with its high percentage of Russians in its population which is, along with the other Baltic states, a NATO nation.

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
